

BARWON RIVER TRAIL

The future 2.5m wide shared pedestrian/cycle path will eventually extend from Buckley Falls Park (and due existing trail) through to the Geelong Ring Road and a future bridge across the river. The sealed shared trail will be located along the upper embankment to maximise connection to residential and recreational areas while meeting allability access requirements. The trail will be developed in stages, subject to funding, and many sections will remain as unsealed paths until the level of use requires upgrade of the surface.

MOUNT BRANDON PENINSULA

New facilities to be established at the existing open space along Rivercurn Drive to provide passive recreation opportunities and improve public access to open space and the river including:

- [7] Extend the future Barwon River Trail along the existing unsealed track at the top of the embankment. Longer term the path will be upgraded to a paved path to the new park areas as Gully 12.
- [8] Provide a 1.5m wide unsealed path down to Baums Weir.
- [9] Retain flat open mown grass area (min 100 x 60m) and sup dress grass to inform ball games and informal recreation.
- [10] Revegetate to establish a gridded transition of parkland planting consisting of scattered indigenous overstorey trees and shaded grass/indigenous groundcover to retain sightlines.
- [11] New viewing and seating area looking west along the Barwon River.
- [12] Protect and provide interpretation of historic mill sites and foundations along the river bank.

MAIN PICNIC AREA

Establish a new picnic area adjoining the Barwon River at Mount Brandon. Facilities will include:

- [13] A small public car park (20-30 spaces) at the end of Orchard View Court.
- [14] New picnic tables and finger toilets as the area becomes more popular (public toilet, electric BBQ and playground facility will be provided in keeping with the natural character of the area).
- [15] Stairs to a river access and fishing platform.

BARWON RIVER BRIDGE

As outlined in the Barwon River Parklands Strategy, a new pedestrian/cycle bridge across the river downstream of the Ring Road will eventually link the existing open space and future shared trail network on the north and south bank. The Bridge will complete the Barwon River Trail loop on cut through to Barwon Paper Mill, Pyrenees Common, Red Gum forest, Queens Park and back to Buckley Falls Park (completion of these works is subject to future State Government funding).

RIVERSIDE WALKING TRACK

The existing informal bush tracks along the river are to remain as a natural surface. This is to ensure they retain a bushland wilderness feel and minimise impacts on cultural heritage and sensitive habitats along the Barwon River.

- [16] Establish new sets of natural design at carefully located key river viewing points.
- [17] Install signage to existing riverside bush tracks.

CULTURAL HERITAGE


The Mount Brandon Peninsula and Barwon River is of cultural significance to the Wathaurong. There are several registered sites of archaeological significance and management of works and protection of cultural heritage will be informed by the development of a Cultural Heritage Management Plan.

This area is also known as the site of the original Buckley Falls mill, dates from the 1850's and was owned by the Wathaurong. The only visible remains are the mill race immediately downstream of Baums Weir however there are probable sites identified for the actual mill, jetty, storage and cottage ruins which can be associated with the site. The Barwon River upstream of Buckley Falls was also the primary source of fresh water in the Geelong area. The lower weir constructed in 1917 was part of the first water supply scheme for Geelong.

COMMUNITY GROUPS

The Friends of Buckley Falls are a voluntary group who have been engaged in weed control and revegetation operations on a continuous basis for over 25 years (1984). This work has played a major role in protection of the significant remnant vegetation and transformation of the other degraded weed infested sections of the park into the significant bushland reserves found today.

The Barwon and Mount Brandon River Advisory Committees advises Council on issues and interests relating to the management of open space along the river. The Committee also liaises with relevant authorities, special interest and community groups on issues relating to the park and consults with sub-divisions to regional, state and federal governments to find improvement works consistent with the existing management plan.

**STAGE 1 WORKS**

The initial stages of works involve connecting the new parkland areas at Mount Brandon Peninsula to Buckley Falls Park and the existing Barwon River Trail network. The proposed works will involve the following:

- [1] New sealed 2.5m wide shared trail with all ability handrail and fire access to the rear of existing private properties.
- [2] New culvert/ridge crossing with timber handrail over the stormwater outfall from Old Flour Mill Road which will also provide critical fire access. The existing informal track along the Barwon River will be retained and linked to a new unsealed path to Ryegp Pool and the existing Buckley Falls stairs, enabling completion of a return walking access.
- [3] Secondary raised path link to Old Flour Mill Road.
- [4] New 1.5m wide unsealed trail link to the lower weir lookout and Buckley Falls stairs alignment (subject to further cultural heritage assessment).
- [5] New 1.5m wide unsealed path link to Rivergum Drive.
- [6] Install vehicle control at the end of Hightett Road and longer term formalise existing unsealed car parking (approx 16 spaces).

ENVIRONMENTAL VALUES

There are sections of remnant natural and indigenous riparian vegetation including scattered Red Gums and areas of Tangled Ligustrum around the Mount Brandon Peninsula, Mature Cypress trees and Sausage Trees which will no longer provide an important contribution to landscape character and will be maintained where possible but additional indigenous trees can be planted to maintain habitat values.

The new reserve is designed to provide sufficient areas to protect and improve environmental values along the river, while providing for increasing levels of recreation and community use associated with adjoining residential and waters areas arriving via the Barwon River Trail.

Over 100 bird species have been recorded in areas along the Barwon River and its tributaries including the banks, areas of prickly shrubs and mature Red Gum trees, particularly those in the areas around Buckley Falls and the adjacent Black Wallaby. There is an existing platypus population which occupy the river upstream and downstream of Baums Weir and this area provides an important refugia during dry years. The Barwon River in this area is also home to a range of snakes, lizards, frogs and frog species and the constructed wetlands in adjoining riverine riparian areas will hopefully provide additional habitat for the threatened Growing Grass Frog.

OVERALL DESIGN INTENT

The following draft objectives were developed in consultation with the local community as part of the Barwon and Mount Brandon River Reserve Plan 2006 and are consistent with the overall Barwon River Parks Strategy:

- Identify, retain and protect existing indigenous and early European species of cultural heritage significance.
- Protect and improve environmental values along the Barwon River progressively controlling exotic weeds, encouraging natural regeneration with indigenous regeneration in accordance with prevailing Ecological Vegetation Classes.
- Continue site re-vegetation using local indigenous species to improve buffer zones between residential development and proposed informal recreation areas and the high value habitat areas along the Barwon River.
- Establish a shared path linking to new open space and residential areas at Mount Brandon Peninsula to Buckley Falls Park and the existing Barwon River Trail.
- Continue staged development of passive recreation facilities and improvements in public access to open space including picnic facilities, viewing/birding areas, a playground, to let facilities and car park improvements in Buckley Falls area.
- Continue leased grazing of large open grass areas away from the Barwon River to minimise maintenance costs and potential weed invasion until required as open space for future residential community and water use.
- Provide a new bridge crossing of the Barwon River downstream of the Ring Road to complete the return path for the Barwon River Trail (subject to State Government funding).
